Message from Chief Medrano: Police, Streets, and Development Services & CPCA Presidency



For the past seven years, I oversaw the Police, Streets, and Development Services Departments (PSDS), or also known as the super department. In this capacity, I led a combined department responsible for public safety, public works, community and economic development, planning, engineering, building services, code enforcement and permitting and licensing.

As of February 27, 2017, the PSDS Departments were no longer a super

department. Our new General Services Director, Joseph Cruz, is now in charge of overseeing Public Works, Community Development, and Economic Development, and I only oversee the Police Department. I have been honored to serve as the Director of PSDS for the past seven years, but I am glad we have Joseph on board!

On April 12, 2017, I will become the President of the California Police Chiefs Association (CPCA). The CPCA was established in 1966 and comprised of more than 1500 members; including California police chiefs, members of their command staff, and retired police chiefs. The Association represents 332 municipal police departments where association members provide public safety for more than 26 million Californians.

CPCA advocates for sound policy and on public safety issues at the state capitol and has an active government relations program. They also provide professional development and training to police chiefs and seconds in command throughout California.

I am honored to serve as the President of the California Police Chiefs Association!

Lisa Campbell was born in Arkansas and moved to the City of Gardena in 1978. One of her first jobs after graduating from Gardena High School was as a babysitter at a dayfor the communicare across the street from Purche Elementary School. During her time there, she would take the children to the playground after school. There, she watched Purche's Drill mail to District 2!

Team preparing for an upcoming Martin Luther King Parade and having been part of the Gardena High School Drill Team herself, she became interested in the Purche Drill Team and would help in whatever they needed. After a short time, they asked her to become part of their drill team and march in the MLK parade. This was the first MLK parade that Gardena had with a specific route and street closures. Its route was from 132nd to Marine and from Western to 162nd St.

In 1989, she was hired at the Gardena Post Office and has been working for Gardena P.O. for the past 28 years. There, she was a mail carrier in District 3 for eight years and then transferred to El Camino Village for 19 years. Most recently, she has been covering District 2. Lisa is a great example of Neighborhood Watch because she is well aware of everyone that lives in the neighborhood, who is and is not home, and the vehicles that are driven by residents. She is very familiar with the residents that she delivers to, that she knows when someone is having a bad day or needs help or words of encouragement. When there is a new neighbor in her area, she makes sure to welcome them to the City. She also knows when something/someone looks suspicious and up to no good. She is always looking out for the community which she lives in and serves. This is why she is a perfect example of Neighborhood Watch. 

Map Your Neighborhood -- a program that can save lives and property in a disaster!

Why Map Your Neighborhood?



"Map Your Neighborhood" (MYN) is a program designed to help neighbors prepare for disasters and is offered through the Gardena Police Department Emergency Preparedness Office.

MYN will help you to:

- Learn the "9 Steps to Take Immediately Following a Disaster" to secure your home and
 protect your neighborhood. It is hard to think clearly following disaster and these steps will help you to
 quickly and safely take actions that can minimize damage and protect lives.
- Identify the Skills and Equipment each neighbor has that would be useful in an effective disaster response. Knowing which neighbors have supplies and skills helps your disaster response to be timely, and allows everyone to contribute to the response in a meaningful way.
- Create a Neighborhood Map identifying the locations of natural gas and propane tanks for quick responses if needed.
- Create a Contact List that helps identify those with specific needs such as the elderly, disabled, or children who may be home alone during certain hours of the day.
