The Gardena Police Department places a strong emphasis on Community Policing, and has successfully implemented a District Policing Program citywide. Within our District Policing Program, Gardena is separated into three Districts, each with its own District Commander and dedicated police officers. By having three Districts, officers become specialized patrol units in each area, understanding the specific needs of the neighborhood and customizing their service to what the residents want. Under this model, we are able to interact one on one with residents and have a stronger knowledge of each neighborhood's uniqueness. By having open lines of communication and consistent community involvement we are continually working on building a stronger community-police partnership. PROTECTING YOUR HOME: BE PREPARED

There are things you can do on the inside of your home to protect and identify your valuables. Some suggestions are:

- **Disperse Valuables:** Do not keep all of your valuables in one place. The first place a burglar looks when he enters your home is the master bedroom and drawers.
- **Photograph Valuables:** Take Individual color photographs of items such as jewelry that cannot be marked or engraved. Sign and date the backs of the photographs to assist in proving ownership.
- **Bank or Safe Deposit Box:** If you have valuable jewelry or other items that you rarely use, keep them in a safe deposit box instead of at home to reduce the risk of them being stolen.
- **Draw Your Blinds:** Use shades or drapes to keep potentially tempting household items out of view. Burglary is sometimes a crime of opportunity and "window-shopping" is one way criminals choose potential targets.



DON'T BECOME A VICTIM! LOCK YOUR 3RD ROW SEATS!

Thieves are targeting Chevy, Cadillac, and GMC full size SUVs (2007-2014 models) and stealing the 3rd row seat. Third row seats are easily and quickly removed (as quickly as a few seconds) from the vehicles and can be sold online, at flea markets or to salvage yards for as much as \$1,000. Although they usually weigh 75-100 pounds, they are easily removable from a target vehicle.

Here are a few preventive recommendations that residents can take to safeguard their vehicles:

- Secure the third row seat with a cable lock. Although locks can be cut, this is a layer of protection to slow the thief down.
- Store the seat if it's not being used.
- Park your vehicle in your garage. If not, back the vehicle to the garage, a fence or wall to hinder thieves from entering the vehicle through the back glass.
- Engrave your VIN (Vehicle Identification Number) on the seat.

Lock it, Hide it, Keep it.



GENERAL VEHICLE BURGLARY TIPS

- Although weather temperature is very high, always close all windows completely!
- Remove all valuables from your vehicle every time you park.
- If valuables must be left behind, hide them out of sight several blocks before reaching your destination.
- When shopping, place purchases in the trunk and out of sight before going to the next shopping area to park.
- Disable internal trunk releases per your owner's manual instructions.
- Remote controls for security garages should never be left inside parked vehicles. They provide future access to returning thieves.
- Always lock your car and completely close the windows, even if you plan to be away for only a minute.
- Take out removable radios/face plates.

Gardena has launched a new mobile app - GardenaDirect - that allows residents to directly report issues such as a pothole or graffiti, and track the resolution of their request via mobile phone or online. This application enables Gardena to enhance civic engagement with the community and address any issues in a fast and convenient manner.

Using GardenaDirect, residents are able to submit a service request simply by downloading the app, selecting from a menu of service requests,

and sending it directly to the City. The app also allows residents to take a picture of the problem and send it in, with the ability of automatically locating the problem, provided GPS and location services are enabled on your mobile device. Submitters are able to follow their request from the initial report to resolution right from their phones. Issues can also be reported via the web at www.ci.gardena.ca.us. To download the free GardenaDirect application, please visit the apple or google app store on your phone.
